

About the course:



“Social Networking in Law Enforcement”

The ever-growing popularity of social networking websites has created a vast network of investigative resources. Not only can information about suspects, victims, witnesses and possible co-conspirators be obtained, but a virtual treasure chest of evidence from various criminal activities can be discovered – and made discoverable. MySpace, Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter have nearly 1 billion user profiles that can

be tapped for critical information, evidence and leads.

Dealing with the content of social networking sites are some of the most significant challenges investigators face today. Sites such as MySpace, Twitter, Linked-In and Facebook present major challenges for investigators who need to locate information, find linkages between people and use the sites for law enforcement purposes. Many crimes are committed and/or evidence of criminal activity is stored on these sites—the list ranges from stalking to identity theft to vandalism and child pornography. Predators gain access to children via these sites; gangs and terrorists are conducting criminal planning via these networks; and a variety of evidence is posted on these sites, such as data, photos and video. To make these investigations even more challenging, social networking sites are not constructed similar to, nor navigated like, traditional websites.

Students will learn how social networking came into its own and discover how law enforcement needs to be ingrained into this virtual world of our tangible society. The course will also cover the facets of data mining social networking sites as well as conduct live exercises which mimic actual cases. Pre-employment investigations, department policy and procedure as well as maneuvering your digital investigation through the courts will be discussed.
