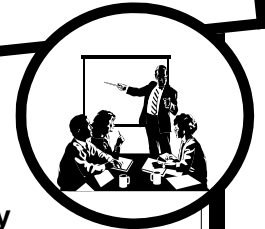

## About the Course:

### “Human Trafficking, Search & Seizure and Laws of Arrest”



**This 8 hour seminar** is designed to provide training in human trafficking, search and seizure and laws of arrest. Two (2) hours will be dedicated to human trafficking. Human trafficking is one of the most heinous crimes that law enforcement officers investigate. In its worst manifestation, human trafficking is akin to modern-day slavery. Victims pay to be illegally transported into the United States only to find themselves in the thrall of traffickers. They are forced into prostitution, involuntary labor and other forms of servitude to repay debts – often entry in the United States. In certain cases, the victims are mere children. They find themselves surrounded by an unfamiliar culture and language without identification documents, fearing for their lives and the lives of their families. The remaining six (6) hours will be dedicated to search and seizure issues with emphasis on stop & frisk, incident to arrest, probable cause, plain view, plain feel, inventory and consent. In addition, laws of arrest issues will be discussed with an over view of Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2935 dealing with misdemeanor and felony arrests, citations, extra-territorial arrests, arrest warrants and protective sweeps. (Should comply with OPOTA’s 2 hour mandate on Human Trafficking for 2013).

He has served as an instructor for the Northwestern University Traffic Institute (NUTI), the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Drug Interdiction Assistance Program. Mr. Healy is a former adjunct professor of constitutional law at Ohio University. He has also served as an expert on search and seizure at the Ohio Attorney General’s Conference on Law
