The FTO is an integral part in assisting the probationary officer to make the transition from the classroom environment to the application of learned skills in field situations. The training program will include information on the role of the FTO, the adult learning concepts, the evaluation process, civil liability issues, coaching and mentoring, ethics, effective communication skills and documentation in the FTO manual. Each student will receive two (2) thorough and detailed comprehensive FTO training manuals (San Jose and LA models) that should serve as a documentation and evaluation tool to successfully promote the development of the probationary officer.

CAPTAIN JACK HALL has recently been awarded the captain position at Cleveland Metroparks Ranger Dept. Prior to this appointment, he served as a detective sergeant, supervising the detective bureau of the Avon Lake Police Department for over 7 years. His bureau's cases focused on financial fraud, drugs and sexual-related crimes. Captain Hall has also completed specialized training in computer forensics and practical homicide investigation. He is a former adjunct faculty member of Lorain County Community College's School of Police Science (1993-1994).

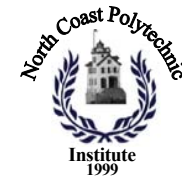
