“**Search and Seizure/Search Warrants**” is designed to provide information to criminal prosecutors and law enforcement officers concerning search and seizure with emphasis upon conducting warrantless searches. The seven exceptions to the warrant rule will be discussed in detail to include: stop and frisk, search incident to arrest, probable cause, plain view, plain feel, inventory and consent. Information will also be provided on the seizure of people, abandonment of property, protective sweep and utilization of a narcotics canine to conduct sniffs of vehicles and objects. In addition, the requirements for completion of a search warrant and related warrant forms will be discussed. The requirements for a nighttime search warrant and a no-knock search warrant will be provided. Numerous court decisions at both the federal and state levels will be reviewed.
